1891 Census

By 1891 they have moved to 68 Sedgley Road. It appears that Mary Hodgkiss, has now died and three more children have arrived. Probably the 9 month old daughter Sarah in the 1881 census is not the same Sarah recorded in the 1891 census as the ages are completely wrong. It was not uncommon at the time that if a child had died, a later child would be given the same name, particularly if it was a family name. There are three records of the death of a Sarah Hodgkiss in this 10 year period. The Hodgkiss family appear to be a typically large family of the time.

1901 Census

By the next census in 1901, Lillian had been born, along with another son, John - known by the family as Jack. Mary has now left home, and Sarah lives with her until she gets married.

1911 Census

As a widow, Ann would have struggled to raise her family and was forced to move out of the house in Coseley. The Toll House would have been a reasonably cheap rent as it was quite a long distance from the village and local amenities. It had no gas, electricity or running water. Water was obtained from a stream which ran behind the house.

This census also shows that Ann had given birth to 14 children of whom 5 had died.

There were now just three children at home, but all of them had a job so financially, they were probably better off. However, more tragedy was on its way. Bill (as William was known) was killed on his first day as a newly qualified passenger guard in 1912, when he was struck by an express train. Ann had to go all the way to Bescot (in Walsall) to identify her brother's body. Mrs Hodgkiss, understandably, took the death of her son very badly.

Some of the information we have about the Toll House and the family has been gathered from interviews with members of the family. Lillian was still alive when the Toll House came to the Museum in the 1970s and her daughter supplied a great of information about the family as well as numerous photographs.

One of the family stories was about Caroline who lost an arm as a child following an accident. The children were playing shops and Caroline, only a toddler, was picking up pretty bits of platter from the ground to use as money, when she was hit by a coal truck. Although she apparently could not peel potatoes, the injury never held her back and she was excellent at knitting!

Such personal information can be obtained through recollections of the people themselves. Although they cannot always be relied upon, they are invaluable as a resource.
